Transitional Services

Our transitional support program provides support to those who have experienced gender-based violence, as they navigate their healing journey. We offer temporary housing support to women and their children, and on-site services which include: 1:1, group, emotional, family court, and parenting support.

Programs for Children

Our children's programming is for all ages, ranging from toddler years to youth aged children. We offer one-on-one support, family activities, education, and summer programming

Programs for Women

Wrap around programming is offered for all women and transgender individuals, living at Ingamo Homes or in the community, those include safety safety, advocacy, community referrals, and various activities.

Community Development

Our community development program focuses on, coordination and facilitation of DART-Oxford and other Community Committees. This allows us to increase communication and coordination between agencies, community services and the regional coordinating committee, while raising awareness and understanding of the issues of gender-based violence in the community.

This past year was a year of change and growth. The ongoing housing crisis in Oxford has been an extreme challenge for us, as families have no where to go when completing Ingamo's program. Safe, affordable housing is critical to women escaping intimate partner violence (IPV), and this barrier is one of the many reasons women stay in abusive homes. This and the persistence of the pandemic has exacerbated an already complex situation for everyone.

Although things have been challenging, the team at Ingamo has persevered and continued to support women, as they seek stability and healing for themselves and their children. To assist with the day-to-day operations, we have added a Manager of Programs and Outreach to our team. Joanna Piatkowski began this position in November 2022, and brings a wealth of knowledge to the role and a deep passion for the work in the Violence Against Women sector. Community Development

We collaborated with Unifor to hold the annual Take Back the Night march in September 2022. Take Back the Night is an annual global protest with the goal of eradicating all types of sexual, relational, and domestic abuse. 50 to 100 people attended our event, which was hosted at Unifor Hall. Moreover, we collaborated with Zonta for our annual flag-raising event in November. To honour the global 16 days of activism campaign against gender-based violence, this event was organized in Museum Square. Zonta, a group of professionals dedicated to strengthening women and girls through service and advocacy, has established itself as a solid and dependable partner for Ingamo.

We co-hosted an event with the Unlearn team in January. Unlearn is a social enterprise that is passionate about encouraging communities to think critically and to be thought-provoking to inspire positive change. The gathering attracted and included many influential leaders. As a community, we were able to start having challenging discussions about race and equity and felt more at ease taking on these efforts together.

Additionally, we were able to completely revamp all our social media profiles, which has greatly improved our online visibility. Numerous municipal council members, activists, and community organizations are now actively engaged with us daily.

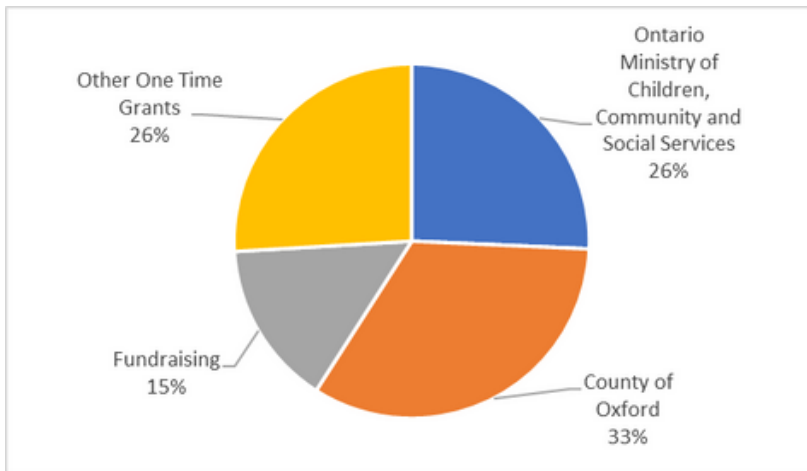
